## BOO-BOO BUNNIES

Message from Pastor Linda

During the children’s message in our Easter morning worship, I showed the children some boo-boo bunnies I had made for them and asked if someone would tell us what a ‘boo-boo’ is. One little girl bravely raised her hand and described them as red marks you get on your body. Another piped in they sometimes bleed. Several commented that they hurt! When I asked if any of them had a boo-boo right now, the response was overwhelming. They all began talking at once, with half of them starting to roll up their sleeves or pull down their socks to show me! These youngsters were well-acquainted with boo-boos! It goes without saying: pain and stings, tears and sadness afflict all of us from our earliest years. There is no minimum age requirement.



In these past weeks, I’ve been thinking quite a bit about tears and pain and sadness, and in particular: **the sting of death**. I’m sure it has a lot to do with officiating four memorial services in this short span - three of them for long-time, beloved members of Salem. Then two weeks ago, I learned a dear friend of mine suddenly lost her husband of 47 years. I think too, of my mom whose Alzheimer’s advances relentlessly. And of course, through Holy Week, my focus was upon Jesus’ own suffering and death.

Unfortunately, boo-boo bunnies don’t cut it in soothing the sting of death. Death is raw and hard and oh-so-final. And though we all wish it didn’t happen, Death is inevitable. Everybody experiences it. The first part of 1 Corinthians 15:22 puts it bluntly: “In Adam all die.” It *seems* death has the final word. It *seems*, but not so!

Yesterday we celebrated Easter - that miraculous day when Jesus rose from the dead – smashing the gates of hell to Life again. I love the powerful words of the Apostle Paul (1 Corinthians 15:55-57, The Message):

Death swallowed by triumphant Life!  
 Who got the last word, oh, Death?  
 Oh, Death, who’s afraid of you now?

It was sin that made death so frightening and law-code guilt that gave sin its leverage, its destructive power. But now in a single victorious stroke of Life, all three—sin, guilt, death—are gone, the gift of our Master, Jesus Christ. Thank God!

Yes, we grieve for our world in all its suffering. We grieve for the loss of loved ones dear to us. But we “do not grieve like the rest of humankind, who have no hope.” (1 Thess. 4:13) Because He lives today, now and forever, we have the promise and the hope of heaven where in Revelation 21, we are promised there will be no more tears, suffering, pain. One day there will be no need for boo-boo bunnies!

The beauty and goodness of Easter is **Jesus**. He is the Victor over our greatest enemy: death itself. On this April Fool’s Day, it is the Lord Himself who has the last laugh, the final word and it is LIFE for us.
