Power of Love in Action *Message from Pastor Linda* This past Saturday was the annual meeting of the East Coast Conference churches. During the time gathered, we listen and learn as others share what God is doing through our churches and ministries throughout the Covenant.

A portion of the meeting is spent doing the business of the Church: approving the budget, voting on changes to by-laws, and other less glamorous work of the church.

My highlight of this year's Annual Meeting came unexpectedly through a 'chance' meeting late in the day. Between sessions, I was speaking with a few pastors from New York when a tall, striking man joined our conversation. He was both dignified and down-to-earth. When I discovered he attends the same church as a good friend of mine, I asked him how he became connected with it. His eyes lit up and he became animated as he unpacked his story.

John had regularly attended church in his teen years with his mother and siblings after his father's death. Though the people sang and preached and talked of God's love, he found they were "mean" to children and youth. At one point in time, he pleaded with his mother, '*Why do we go to church where the people are mean?*' When he reached adulthood, he walked away from church which in his experience was devoid of genuine love and warmth. The Church was place where the people didn't practice what they preached.

Fast forward 20+ years, John found himself in a high-pressure position with enormous stress. People in the office were constantly on edge ... except one ...the office administrator. She seemed unflappable and consistently patient and kind toward everyone. She was the calm in the eye of the storm whirling about her. Exasperated with the continual tumultuous dynamics of his workplace, John asked her one day, "*How do you remain so peaceful in the midst of such tension*?" She began to share her faith and invited him to come to church with her.

Filled with skepticism, John accepted her invitation. Warily, he attended a service only to be surprised and moved by the authenticity of the love people showed not only toward God but toward each other! It was visibly evident they

possessed a genuine desire to love others to the best of their ability, caring for others in need, and putting others' needs first. This was a church that was living into what Apostle John writes in 1 John 3:18, "*Dear children let us not love with words or tongue, but with actions and in truth.*" This was a church that practiced what it preached: Love one another. Ultimately, it was the love and grace of God's people that drew John to Jesus.



As I reflect on John's story of faith, I am reminded again of the transformational power of love when it is lived out in practical ways. When we actively love those around us, we become a living, breathing embodiment of Christ's love. People notice. Love brings hope to our divisive, hurting world. Here at Salem, we are by no means perfect. At times, we find ourselves irritated with another, or hoping someone else will volunteer to serve. We may not even like certain folks! It's why John in his epistle urges us to confess our sins.

Yet, I give thanks for our church family's efforts, humbly doing its best to love those who come through our doors on any given Sunday. Imperfect as we are, we are sincerely working, by Gods' grace, to practice what we preach here: *Since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another*. (1 John 4:11) Not with lip service. Not with empty words. But with action. Dear Church, may we be God's light and love to each other and to our broken world so that others may know God is LOVE.

FINANCIAL UPDATE FROM OUR CHURCH CHAIR

Dear Salem Church family,

I just wanted to give a quarterly update as to the financial state of the church. As of the end of March 2024, we had a \$10,944 deficit between funds received and the church's operating expenses. This is approximately 20% of the deficit we projected in our 2024 budget, which is close to "on schedule" since we are a quarter of the way through the year.

However, God is always faithful, and we remain grateful for, and in awe of, His continued blessing of our church. It is very exciting to see the ways in which God has guided and supported our church already this year! Thank you for your prayers and commitment to the mission and ministry of Salem!

Every year the town supplies a huge dumpster for Earth Day and the Environmental Council invites neighbors and organizations to adopt a road. The cleanup was an adventure of sorts as we tallied how many bottles of one particular 'beverage' we picked up, shared with each other what kinds of animal skeletons we discovered (this year it was fox, deer and squirrel), and who picked up the strangest debris.

Though this year's turnout (5) for Earth Day clean-up was substantially smaller than last year's (30+), eight 30gallon bags of trash were picked up and added to the dumpster. And even though our crew was smaller this year, so was the amount of trash that needed to be collected. Progress!

GLOBAL 6K WALK/RUN FOR WATER

Why 6K?

This is the average distance women and girls in the Congo walk to collect water for their community. (And sadly, the water they do collect is often unsanitary.)

This sum of \$50 will provide water for a lifetime for one child!
