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JESUS, BRIGHT MORNING STAR

Message from Pastor Linda

Many of my friends who live in cities and/or large towns have commented how surprised and amazed they are when they visit our home here in Washington and look up in the sky. They had no idea one could see so many stars at night! The darker the night, the brighter the stars seem to shine. As I consider the stars, it's impossible for me to not think about Night.

There is nothing inherently wrong or even 'bad' about night. Many people love the night with its solitude and quiet. Night was created by God. Genesis tells us, "Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness (chaos) was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness. God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night."

To be more specific, it is not the *night* that brings uncertainty or fear for so many, but rather what darkness holds. In her book, Prayers in the Night, Tish Harrison Warren, writes, "Imagine a world without electric light, a world lit dimly by torch or candle, a world full of shadows lurking with unseen terrors, a world in which no one could be summoned when a thief broke in and no ambulance could be called, a world where wild animals hid in the darkness, where demons and ghosts and other creatures of the night were living possibilities for everyone... For much of history, night was simply terrifying." She goes on to quote 18th century theologian, Edmund Burke, who said there was no other "idea so universally terrible in all times and in all countries as darkness."

People, through the ages, and still today have always felt most vulnerable when darkness comes – literally and/or figuratively. Darkness holds unknown threats, uncertainty, and anxiety. We don't know what is lurking in the shadows. It is in the dark, as we lie in bed, that our imaginations often take hold of us, or our fears and worries run unchecked. Morning can't come soon enough.

Darkness takes on even greater meaning in the Bible. Most often, it symbolizes misery, destruction, death, ignorance, sorrow, or wickedness. People living in 'darkness' are living in a place of despair and hopelessness.

It is no wonder the Bible speaks then of the glorious Light – Jesus Himself.

Darkness cannot overcome light.

Darkness cannot deter God's plan or purposes.

Darkness cannot hinder God's work.

Darkness cannot obscure His sight.

It is while it is yet dark the **bright Morning Star**, Jesus, appears. The bright Morning Star is the sign of Hope. It signals that a new day is coming. Darkness is fleeing. As the apostle John writes in 1 John, "the darkness is passing and the true light is already shining."

As we begin the new year, we cannot know nor see what lies ahead. The future is obscure. Therefore, let us keep our eyes fixed on Christ, our bright Morning Star. Just as the star so long ago guided the wisemen, may Jesus lead us through times of uncertainty, He will keep our way straight and true. And in those times or seasons of darkness, may we see the Bright Morning Star as a sign of hope that morning is coming. There will be a new day – a fresh beginning full of promise. Jesus has promised us: I am the light of the world. The one who follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life. Have a blessed and bright New Year.


