THE SERENITY PRAYER Message from Pastor Linda

Last week it was shared during worship I was

headed to AZ to help in the transition of moving my mother to a higher level of care. Those who have walked this path with aging parents understand the myriad of emotions that come with it and the family dynamics that can often be triggered. As I processed some of my thoughts and concerns prior to the trip, a friend of mine made the insightful suggestion that I carry the Serenity Prayer with me as I went. If you are not familiar with it, it goes like this:

God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference. Living one day at a time, enjoying one moment at a time; accepting hardship as a pathway to peace; taking, as Jesus did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it; trusting that You will make all things right if I surrender to Your will; so that I may be reasonably happy in this life and supremely happy with You forever in the next.

Amen.

Through the sad process of packing, moving and caring for my mom in a compressed, few days, this simple prayer served as an anchor for me. In those moments when I was keenly aware of my own powerlessness or fatigue, the prayer helped me to center myself in Christ rather than in the situations I found myself. When I was too tired to find the words to express my heart to the Lord, I would pray this prayer, letting my heart linger over the words. Whether in the waiting room of the ER, or while packing/unpacking the boxes, or even returning home on the plane, its faithful and wise words served as healing balm for my heart, reminding me over and over again to trust in the Lord, to breathe, to savor the sweet moments, and to honor the hard.

I share this personal experience because so many, many people in our small congregation are walking through hard seasons, facing all different types of situations: health issues, aging family members, challenging relationships, difficult transitions (expected or unexpected), precarious financial futures, and so forth. It's in these kinds of moments that many often find the words to pray elusive. Where to start? What to say? How do we give voice to all that is stirring inside? Our souls yearn to be in communion with the peace of God.

These are the moments we can look to saints before us, or saints around us, who have put their thoughts into words, and formed their words into prayers. Using others' sincere prayers to the Lord may be as authentic as using our own. They serve as 'bread crumbs' along the way, guiding us along paths we've never walked, or those we know all too well. Prayer books, the Psalms, and other resources are hugely helpful in these seasons.

So if you find yourself in a place of being overwhelmed, or not sure what or how to pray, consider picking up a book of prayers, such as the <u>Rabbit Room's</u> *Every Moment Holy, Volumes 1 and* 2, <u>Praying Our Goodbyes</u>, <u>Prayers for Difficult</u> <u>Times: When You Don't Know What to Pray</u>, or any host of other collections of prayers. Chances are someone has been through what you are going through and has written a prayer that will resonate with your soul. Finally, it goes without saying, nothing can be better than having others and the Holy Spirit praying and interceding for you.

This book addresses:


Bigger allowances.

Parents, Punchinello's lesson in love will help you speak God's heart to the heart of your own children: You are special, not because of the things you have, but because you are mine.

In the month of October, we will be starting up our Colorful Prayer Series. This year, the first week of every month, I will be running it. Each child will be given a prayer book to use. At the end of the school year, these prayer books will be taken home to keep. Both Sunday School and Dive Deep will be participating in this

During the second and third Sunday of the month, the children will be divided up based on grade level. The Sunday School group, kindergarten through third grade, will be starting at the beginning of Jesus's Storybook. They will be watching a video and then creating an interactive craft that helps the children retell the story at home. The Dive Deep Group will start where they left off in the Journey to Justice Curriculum. Our goal is to get through the curriculum this year. Please remember that if your child is in fourth through eighth grade, they will attend Dive Deep.

The last Sunday of each month we reserve for Acts of Love. Last week, the children made brownies and froze them. They are waiting to be distributed to members of our church and community who may need a little "pick-me-up". If anyone has an idea for our Acts of Love, please feel free to share it with me or Deb Houldin, our Chair of Spiritual Formation.



ERC FUNDS

Last year at this time, our church learned that as a non-profit organization we might qualify for Employment Retention Credit (ERC) program. ERC is a stimulus program was designed to help small businesses and non-profits that were able to retain their employees during the Covid-19 pandemic. Established by the CARES Act, it is a refundable tax credit – a grant, not a loan. The East Coast Conference referred

churches in our conference to Hundredfold Consulting LLC, which would help churches through the paperwork. There was no retaining fee for their service; they would receive 10% of the amount we qualified and paid only after these funds were received by Salem.

In spring 2023, Deborah Griesbach and Pastor Linda provided the required information to Hundredfold Consulting to submit on our behalf, with the hope we might qualify for these funds. The paperwork was filed online in June. Much to our surprise, Salem was eligible to receive \$37,370.70 + interest. In August, our church received \$40,647. After paying Hundredfold Consulting, the Church Council made the unanimous decision to tithe 10%, (\$1845.53 to Washington/Warren Food Pantry and \$1845.53 to our Benevolent* fund). The remainder of the money will be held in our savings account at National Covenant Properties.

*Salem's Benevolent Fund – This fund is used to assist our church members in need of immediate financial assistance for such things as fuel, heating oil, food, gasoline, rent/mortgage, counseling, medications and more.

PLANS FOR FUTURE AIR CONDITIONING

Our congregation gathered after Worship on Sunday, September 10 for a Special Meeting to talk about the possibility of putting in air conditioning at Salem. To help prepare for the meeting, an information sheet was sent out twice in advance of the meeting to help inform the congregation of the genesis of this possible project, the costs for different options and the pros and cons of seeing this project to fruition.

After some considerable discussion, a motion was made and seconded to approve action being taken to have air conditioning installed. The motion passed with a simple majority vote in favor of this. Following the vote, discussion turned to what the scope of the project should be: air conditioning for a) only the Sanctuary; b) the Sanctuary and Lydia room; or c) the Sanctuary, Lydia room and Fellowship room. Some discussion ensued and it was agreed that more information was needed regarding the additional cost of the electrician's work for each possibility, and an estimate of how much it will impact our electricity bill.

A motion was made "to charge the Council with securing more specific information for each of the three (3) scenarios, to further clarify pricing, funding options, and logistics, and return to the Congregation with final recommendation to vote on, and rational behind the recommendation." It passed unanimously.

To this endeavor, work has begun to gather more details and proposals for the A/C installation, the electrical work, and the cost estimations for use. The Council has met once for further discussion and will meet on October 18 with both the A/C rep and Electrician to go over specific numbers/costs of each option. It is the intention of the Council to be fiscally responsible as the church moves forward on this. The Council will keep the congregation posted about the next Special Business meeting to discuss its recommendation.

KITCHEN UPGRADE UPDATE, By Michel Williams, Kitchen Project Manager

Our temporary gas stove/oven have been installed as well as the propane tank supplying fuel for its use. It should be functional by this week

Long response delays for the final exhaust hood and fire suppression drawings have delayed a complete review of our full kitchen plans by the Washington Building Department. These delays have occurred despite many requests to get this information for our fall application. It has been promised now for early in the first week of October. Keep praying that this promise is realized!

Next steps:

- Once the above drawings are received and our complete proposal is submitted to the Town Building Department, their full review will begin. When the proposal is approved (pending any changes or requirements for code compliance), we will begin our next steps to prepare for the dishwasher, exhaust hood and fire suppression system that will protect the stove area in the unlikely event of a fire in that location.
- All of the equipment for the kitchen upgrade has been ordered and will be delivered and installed as the work in the kitchen is made ready for each item.
