#### HOLY WEEK SERVICES & EASTER

Without fail, Holy Week observances and Easter is a very special time for the Church. We gathered together downstairs on Maundy Thursday, with 18 of us seated around a table, eating and breaking bread together. This special evening, the story of Jesus' last supper was recounted, Communion was shared, songs were sung, and each person was anointed with oil, blessed as they left to serve the Lord through their gifts.





On Good Friday, the Church gathered for Tenebrae: The Service of Shadows. Through this somber worship service, we listened once again to the story of the Passion: Jesus' betrayal, arrest, trial and crucifixion. We were reminded once more of Jesus' sacrifice for all of us. As the readers narrated the service, the shadows grow longer and the night deeper, until only the Christ candle remained lit. Then finally as the last strains of the hymn, Were You There? were sung, the Christ candle was carried out and all was in darkness, save for the Cross above us. We left with our thoughts in remembrance of the Holy One's suffering.

Then on Easter morning, everything was transformed. The gloom was gone - joy and exuberance erupted in color and song and

pageantry. It started quietly, at first, at the Community Sunrise service at the Stone Church Green as the sun and its rays broke forth over the horizon. Five different churches' clergy led this humble service in the early dawn with almost a hundred from around the community gathered.





As the sun rose higher, Salem gathered for a wonderful, vibrant, full of joy time of celebration of the Risen Christ. Jillian carried the Christ candle to the altar as a declaration of

Christ's victory over death. It was wonderful to see so many gathered together and fill the excitement and joy in the air. After the service, our younger children participated in the traditional Easter Egg Hunt. It was a beautiful day. Thank you's to Susan Klein and our Choir, to Diane Swanson and Elaine Babiyan for the coordination of the Easter flowers; to those who donated candy for the Easter eggs and to Gail Covillion who filled all the eggs!

#### **AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH**





As part of recognizing Autism Awareness Month, Kevin Cassesse, Development Officer, was invited to come and speak about the on-going mission and services of Ädelbrook – an agency that provides education and services for those on the autism spectrum. At our Worship service on Sunday, April 23, Kevin talked about the number of students that they are now serving state-wide, 315, and the staff support, 600+, for them. He also shared about two exciting new developments: 1) they are just now launching a Used Book Store. This new business will serve as a hands-on job training for their transitional students. And 2) they have also initiated a food pantry for those who are coping with food insecurity in the region. Many of the families associated with Ädelbrook, either through the students or staff, will be able to benefit from this new community outreach.

Our church can help by donating used books in good or excellent condition. The books may be for any age and about most topics. If you would like to

contribute your gently used books, you may drop them off at the church all the month of May. Ädelbrook will send a driver/van to come and pick them up.

# EAST COAST CONFERENCE ANNUAL MEETING, By Starr Evans

This past Saturday (29 April) I represented Salem as a delegate to the 133rd annual meeting of the East Coast Conference of the Evangelical Covenant Church. Prior to the meeting each delegate was emailed a packet of material, a whooping 138 pages, to review before the meeting. It was a reminder that we (Salem) are part of a larger organization which requires regular care and updating in order to serve God and meet the needs of people in our communities. Just as a reminder, the East Coast Conference is headquartered in Cromwell, CT but it covers a large geographic area, from New Sweden, Maine to Newport News, Virginia.

While at the meeting I met delegates from VA, PA, NY, MA and CT - all there to do the work of the East Coast Conference and hear about the many new things happening in the our conference. One of those delegates was Bekah Lindberg, our last pastoral Intern t was so good to see her! I also met and had a chance to chat with Tammy Swanson-Draheim, the President of the Evangelical Covenant Church. I found her to be a wise, compassionate woman who really listened to my thoughts.



Part of the regular business was the election of the East Coast Conference Executive Board. I am pleased to report that Michel Williams was re-elected as the Chair of the Board and Michael Ravelo was re-elected as a Director.

Delegates and guests at the meeting heard from Jim Condap, Executive Director of Pilgrim Pines Camp and Retreat Center (an East Coast Conference agency) and Stephen Cushing, Executive Director of the New England Seafarers Mission (an agency of the Evangelical Covenant Church) about the good works done at both agencies. Each Director mentioned the ever-present need for financial support and reiterated the East Coast Conference suggested contribution of 1% of our annual budget to Pilgrim Pines and .5% of our annual budget to New England Seafarers Mission. I saw this as a reminder once again that we are called to care for others, not just ourselves.

We heard about various services and programs designed to help pastors and lay leaders and congregations grow and develop their leadership skills. We also heard about Women's Ministries led by Nan Lingenfelter. Nan sends out a newsletter *News from Nan* three times a year with information about events of interest to women who wish "to learn from one another and see how the Lord is living practically in their lives."

Howard Burgoyne, our East Coast Conference Superintendent had three questions for the delegates, and therefore our churches as well.

- 1. Where do you see God around you?
- 2. How is God meeting you?
- 3. Where might God be making things new around you?

These are thought provoking questions worth thinking about. I will leave them for you to ponder.
